Community Engagement 2019

We managed to have several successful cuddle events with the Chandler-Gilbert Community College Pecos and Williams campus' and Arizona State University Polytechnic Campus. One such case of AZ CARE making an impact on the community was with the ASU students. Our mission made a positive impact on them and in doing so prompted them to start the Poly Devil Cats club. The club's main goal was to assist in TNRing and if possible, rehoming the campus cats and kittens that had taken up residence on school grounds. Though the club is only a recent startup, they have already trapped around 30 cats and kittens and all but 2 have found loving homes or have been TNR'd. The club opportunity allows students to serve their community and to also see if a veterinarian career is something they would be interested in before making a big decision such as changing their major. Through the club they get firsthand experience working with animals, treating mild medical conditions, and learning the basics of caring for animals in their time of need.

Sparrow

From the Euthanasia List to her forever home

Meet Sparrow: Sparrow is a 2 1/2 year old Golden GSD. Sparrow was surrendered by her owners to PCACC in June with no reason given. According to the shelter staff, when she was surrendered, she was a normal, sweet dog.

After she spent a month in the shelter, Sparrow had deteriorated to the point that she was placed on the Euthanasia list because the staff could not put a leash on her, she was extremely fearful, and was beginning to exhibit severe signs of kennel stress.

We worked with the vet to help her with her Anxiety, placing her on a daily regimen of Anti-Anxiety Medication. This, along with slow introductions to new stimuli and changing things around her one step at a time, helped get her ready for her forever home. We are elated to report that Sparrow found her forever home in September of 2019.



Jade

When a fearful dog gets a second chance

Jade was only 6 months old when she was surrendered to Pinal County Animal Care and Control.

Jade had 3 strikes against her.. 1. She's a black dog, 2. She's a Pit mix, and 3. She's a fear dog. You see, Jade was afraid of EVERYTHING. People, things, anything new in her life. Her fosters put up a swimsuit drying rack in their backyard and she refused to go outside on her own for 3 weeks.

We pulled Jade from County, worked really hard to get her to come out of her shell, and then finally enlisted the help of a trainer who has a ton of experience with fear dogs.

With training, dedication from the foster family, and an understanding family, Jade found her new home after 9 months in the rescue.

A follow up from her new family gave us this: "She's been so great, we are having so much fun with her. We had some family over recently and absolutely no issues."

Shortened Tail

In May of 2019, ASU Facilities on the Polytechnic campus contacted us asking us to help this sweet kitty! They found her very injured with half of her tail raw and missing. Upon further examination from the vet we learned that the end of her tail had two spots of bone infection and the base of the tail was dislocated. She ended up having to have her tail amputated. Her surgery was a complete success thanks to the skillful vet's at Arizona Animal Wellness Center. We are full of gratitude to everyone who help contribute to our fundraiser for Peralta and we are happy to report that, after healing from her surgery, this sweet kitty found an amazing forever family.



Shrub


Survivor

This sweet boy was very injured when he was brought into care and, upon an examination at the vet, x-rays showed that he had been shot with bb's, one in a leg and two in the face. He has gotten the medical attention he so desperately needed and will have a new life away from the cruelty of the streets as a loved house cat. This sweet boy also tested positive for FIV, however this kitty can still live a normal life with proper medical & dental monitoring. Although one might assume that his FIV diagnosis would make him act sick...it does not. He is charming and loves cuddles. At first glance, one might think that the numbers for 2019 don't look that impressive. What you can't see is that for 2018 we finished out the year in a fairly sizeable deficit. To finish out 2019 in the black, is a huge feat. As you can see the majority of our costs (69%!) are for spay/neuter, vaccines, and medical expenses. These are just the basics so that we can bring them to events for adoption. An additional 13% goes to food, litter, toys, and other supplies for our animals while they are in foster, awaiting their forever homes. Although it seems like a small amount, we are immensely proud of what we have acommplished for 2019 and we believe that we will continue to improve, streamline, and still be able to help many animals through 2020!
